Freedom Flight Update: Bev and I made a quick trip to the Kansas City area August 3rd and 4th to see the vintage aircraft on their way east (marking the 50th Anniversary of the end of WW II). The weather did not cooperate--low clouds and some rain--so we were either flown over or circumvented by many participants. We did see a host of AT-6's, SNJ's, a few BT-113's, AT-11's, C-45's, and C-47's, but no bomber or fighter aircraft. A special kick for me was a PT-19 (the type I flew in primary at Chickasha, OK. in 1942) that showed up. Never thought I'd see one of them again. I hope many of you were able to visit other Freedom Flight locations. Ernie Pence tells me he went to Oshkosh, Wisconsin this year and a great many WW II aircraft flew in. Incidentally, if you haven't been to Oshkosh, you really should make every effort to go. You cannot believe the numbers and kinds of aircraft which fly into there each year. WARNING--if you decide to go, plan way ahead--reserve early or you may be quartered 50 miles away. Usually held the first part of August.

I know that several of you are members of the Society of the Strategic Air Command at Offutt in Omaha and receive their Newsletter the KLAXON. Therefore, you know a "Golden Anniversary" is planned for the Strategic Air Command. SAC was established March 21, 1946--the mainstay of SAC's strike force was the B-29, one hundred fortyeight of them. We have about that many bombers today. The Society and the SAC Museum plan six months of activity--but the beginning is set for March 21-23, 1996. Memorial Update

As mentioned in the last update, the granite has been ordered and is due to be delive r e d



sometime in December. At that time, Dodd's Monuments will begin layout of the design on the actual stone, and any changes necessary will be made. Once that design stage is completed, a detailed drawing will be submitted to the Museum staff for their final approval or revision. This is that "gentle" timeframe that I refer to as the "incubation period." We have made the initial commitment and submitted our draft artwork. Now the project is in the hands of the experts.

By the time you read this article, the government should be back in business. But, as I write this, all "non-essential" federal employees are furloughed. Someone inside the Washington Beltway has concluded that the definition of "nonessential" includes all Museum employees, as well as the numerous unpaid volunteers who provide so much time and assistance. As a result, the gates to the Museum are now closed and locked, awaiting resolution of the Budget Crisis. The only reason that I mention this is that I would normally have some "pearl" from the Museum Staff for inclusion here, but must forego same for the above mentioned reason.

There has been so much interest in the Memorial Wall concept that the Museum Staff has already selected sites for two other identical walls for use when the first one is filled with memorial plaques. All three sites will be connected by walkways. This is a positive development, indicating the high level of acceptance for the first wall. In addition to the numerous plaques being installed, a beautiful bronze eagle rests atop the wall, adding another dimension not originally expected. (See photo on page 8). Both of the other benches at "our" wall have been placed, and it was subsequently discovered that the concrete pads they sit on need to be enlarged to provide additional walk-around space for visitors. We have held meetings with the Museum Staff and the Memorial Contractor to ensure that the base for our bench will be sufficiently large to avoid this problem.

Early indications from Mike and Marjean Gingrich are that this reunion will be one of the largest, if not the largest, we have had to date. A tremendous amount of work has already been done to ensure that each attendee has a great time in Dayton. I would like to personally encourage everyone who is part of our 307th Bomb Wing family to attend. This especially applies to those of you who, for one reason or another, have been unable to attend any of the previous reunions. One thing we have discovered from past reunions is that everyone becomes an active participant almost immediately. If you're worried about not knowing anyone, or being considered an "outsider". . I can assure you that you will be amazed at just how quickly you will find others who are eager to meet you and exchange memories. The intervening years quickly evaporate, all barriers are down, and you will be transported back to the Lincoln era, recalling memories, events, and people long forgotten.

So, if there is anyway at all that you can make it, please plan to attend and see the 307th Bomb Wing Family permanently memorialized in the official United States Air Force Museum Memorial Park. Long after we are all gone, visitors will see our memorial, and our legacy will live on.

REUNION SITES

The 1996 Dayton Reunion will be headquartered at the I-675 Holiday Inn Conference Center and Homewood Suites, actually located in Fairborn, Ohio, home of Wright Patterson Air Force Base and the Balkan Peace talks. These hotels are adjacent to one another, and guests have reciprocal use of all facilities. Each day, there will be a Hospitality Room at the Holiday Inn, a great place to meet your friends and reminisce.

Thursday's daytime activities are optional, but include golf at the **Wright Patterson Golf Course** or antiquing and lunch at the **Golden Lamb** in historic Lebanon, Ohio. One favorite bit of trivia about the Golden Lamb is that several Presidents and Charles Dickens stayed there.

Thursday will find us at the **United States Air Force Museum** for a cocktail reception and dinner under the wings of the airplanes in the **Modern Museum of Flight.** The Museum staff will have cockpits open for viewing on a half dozen different aircraft, including the Stealth Fighter.

Friday morning we will be back at the **Air Force Museum** for the Memorial Dedication Ceremony. Shuttle buses will be available throughout the afternoon for those who wish to visit the Museum after the ceremony.

Friday evening we will cruise on the **Ohio River** near **Cincinnati.** We will depart from **Covington, Kentucky** and cruise the river as we dine. It should be beautiful to watch the city lights begin to glow, and to see **Riverfront Stadium**, home of the Cincinnati Reds aglow.

Holiday Inn for our business meeting. At this time, we will select the site for our 1998 Reunion. It is time **now** to begin thinking about where you would like to go. Those of you in "congenial locations," should be preparing to entice us there. For the Dayton Reunion Committee, the Business Meeting and 1998 Site Selection are much anticipated events. Reunion photos will be taken Saturday afternoon, at the hotel.

Our Reunion Banquet will be Saturday evening at **Wright State University.** The University has built a new **Conference and Continuing Education Center,** just across the street from the Holiday Inn, that has a facility large enough to accommodate the four hundred plus people we expect to attend the reunion.

Sunday, we will be back at the **Holiday Inn** for a Departure Brunch. We have planned this as an event with flexible timing in order to accommodate airline departure schedules.

In addition to a variety of sites, we have tried to include a cacophony of sounds for the Dayton Reunion.

Thursday evening at the Museum, you will have to rely on your memory of the sound of warbirds screaming down the runway.

Friday morning, however, will include not only a **bugler**, but an entire **Pipe**

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Regiment to lead us from the Museum Atrium to the Dedication site.

Friday evening during the dinner cruise, we will be entertained by a **Dixie Land Band. The Tom Harding Trio** is the most frequently requested group for activities featuring the Ohio River. They recently provided entertainment for Cincinnati's *Tall Stacks* celebration.

Saturday's Banquet will feature **Jim** McCutcheon, the Dayton area's acoustic guitar wizard. McCutcheon has been described as "one of the more inventive exponents of acoustic guitar wizardry." One music critic said of him: "his standards for his own music are exacting. When he performs, expect wonderful things." McCutcheon teaches guitar at three Dayton area universities, and at a Montessori School. He directs a teaching studio with his wife. He is listed on the Ohio Arts Council's Touring Roster. McCutcheon is the guitar adviser to the National Federation of Music Clubs, president of the Dayton Classical Guitar Society, and host of "The Intimate Guitar," on radio. Jim will entertain us during the Reception prior to dinner, and during dinner as well.

Following dinner, we will be entertained by the **FTD Sauerkraut Band.** This German Oom-Pah Band was formed in the early 1970's by a group of military and civilian employees of the Air Force Foreign Technology Division at Wright Patterson. The band dresses in authentic Lederhosen, and will play their signature "Polka" music and then provide sounds of the fifties for those who wish to dance.


Saturday morning will find us at the

The Homewood Suites Hotel offers free **continental breakfast** to all who chose to stay there. For those at the Holiday Inn, the Hospitality room will offer complimentary **coffee, tea, Danish and Muffins** each morning. Afternoons in the Hospitality room we will provide complimentary **soft drinks, iced tea,** and if funds permit, beer. The Hospitality Room will be open during all time periods that members are not outside of the hotel for scheduled activities.

Thursday's optional excursion to Lebanon will include a *pris fixe* luncheon at the Golden Lamb. Lunch will feature the Inn's signature dish, *Roast Leg of Lamb*, with traditional accompaniments and *Apple Pie with Shaker Crumb Topping* for dessert. 
Following the Memorial Dedication on Friday morning, there will be what the committee is calling, a "Mini-Reception." So that attendees and members can linger in the area, there will be *punch and cookies* to enjoy.



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

Watch That Bar Talk!!!



ARS Patch, Continued

In the last issue of the newsletter, we published a very poor reproduction of the 307th Air Refueling Squadron patch, which had been sent our way. The article evoked the following response from H. A. "Jack" Frost, which came to us via e-mail:

"I vaguely remember being part of the "design team" but it was a casual effort since SAC didn't allow squadron emblems on aircraft at that time. Seems like Major Jean Nutty was the instigator and the emblem was painted on Major Nutty's Crew's A/C #375 (without official approval) next to the forward entry door. The design was never approved by the high mucky-mucks because the dice in the design was connotated as gambling and SAC couldn't promote that! The emblem was then ordered removed from the aircraft. The newsletter picture was a little dark but a roman numeral III was behind the dice and stood for 3, the black border was the 0 and the dice made the 7, hence 307. The background was green as was the 307th ARS's identifying tail stripe. You can see the emblem painted on a KC-97G at the Pima County Museum in Tucson, AZ. I got out of the squadron & the USAF in 1957 but no patches were ever available or worn until years later at the 307th ARS reunions. A "politically correct" emblem was approved before I got out but I don't believe it was ever used. It had no character!"



A better rendition of the "politically incorrect" ARS emblem is shown above, while the official, "politically correct" heraldry approved emblem is shown below. For the time being, however, we shall adopt the "politically incorrect" version with the dice, because it reflects the spirit and attitude of those of us at Lincoln. Higher headquarters and "political correctness" were not on the flight line with us, so we'll disregard their edict, at risk of being recalled for courts-martial.



On a more somber note, when you visit the Air Force Museum Memorial Park, be sure to see the 307th ARS Memorial dedicated to a crew which was lost shortly after the conclusion of Desert Storm. Sacrifice knows no time period.
