

The historians' names and addresses are on Page 2 in the Chairman's Committee List. One more thing, we really could use the help of a couple of aircrew members (pilot and radar/nav volunteers) to help us with the history--to collect, sort, arrange and tell the stories of the air--special missions, near misses, stories of bold adventure, moments of fear, bad times, and good times. How about some crew stories which haven't been told? Spin your memory bank, dig out the stories and send them to **Bob** or **Ernie**. Maybe in time we can generate enough to

produce our own history book.

Bud Flanik tells me actions are continuing to enable placement of a 307th Memorial at the Air Force Museum in Dayton. Many of you have been generous in your contributions and our fund is growing (see Treasurer's Report, page 5), but as you can see we still need more dollars to put it over the top--our goal is \$4,500. Dayton, home of the Wright Brothers and the site of their innovative bicycle shop, is also the home of much of the leading edge technology of the Twentieth Century. From Huffman Prairie, where Wilbur and Orville strove to improve their flying machines, to McCook Field, where parachutes were first developed for the Air Service, to Wright Field, to Wright-Patterson AFB, Dayton has blazed the aviation trail. Beyond this aviation heritage, Dayton has also given us the cash register, automotive self starters, the ubiquitous pop-top beverage can, electronic ignition, inertial navigation, full color photo copying and ink jet printers.

Wright-Patterson AFB, the largest Air Force installation in the country, attests to the significance that aviation has always played in this area. It is presently the home to the Air Force Materiel Command, which provides all developmental and logistical support for the Air Force. Aeronautical Systems Center, and its predecessors, have researched and developed all USAF aircraft since World War I. The Air Force Wright Laboratories (Avionics, Flight Dynamics, Propulsion, and Materiel Labs) provide the leading edge technological base for our air superiority.

Wright-Patt also serves as the home of the United States Air Force Museum; a facility considered by many to be the finest aviation museum in the world. How appropriate to schedule a reunion of the finest SAC Bomb Wing in Dayton!

Planning is well underway for the 1996 Dayton Reunion of the 307th Bomb Wing B-47/KC-97 Association. Reunion activities will start on **Thursday 20 June** and will run through **Sunday 23 June**. The reunion committee has been formed and meets with regularity to plan an interesting, memorable weekend in this Heartland of America location. Your Dayton reunion planners are **Charlie and Peggy Baker**, **Dick Finke**, **Bud and Jan Flanik**, **Mike and Marjean Gingrich**, **Ray Jones**, **Glenn and Dot Lally**, **Jim**

Mann, Paul Navin, Tom Saltsman, and Tom and Eunice Taylor. Mike Gingrich, the stuckee as reunion chairman, has stated that with such a capable committee, that he should have no real work to do...only the fun stuff!

The committee is striving to make this reunion not only exciting, with a variety of activities, but meaningful as well. The centerpiece of our reunion will be the dedication of a 307th Bomb Wing Memorial Bench at the Air Force Museum. **Bud Flanik**, who is serving as coordinator of the memorial project, has an article elsewhere in this issue with details.

The Holiday Inn I-675 Conference Center and Homewood Suites has been selected as our reunion headquarters. In proximity to both the AF Museum and WPAFB, the hotel is situated in an excellent location within a new office/ shopping park. This hotel has a special program for military reunions, and offers many amenities as a result. Particularly attractive, the committee believes, is that the hotel will offer free airport shuttle service, and free shuttle service to the AF Museum and to a new, nearby upscale shopping mall. Within five minutes walk are several restaurants, book stores, and small shops, as well as numerous offices of aerospace companies serving the Air Force. Immediately across the street is Wright State University, one of the fastest growing institutions in the country. (Wright State achieved national attention a decade ago with Dr Petrofsky's pioneering research of computer controlled nerve stimulation which enabled paraplegics with spinal nerve separations

to exercise, bicycle, and walk under their own power.)

The committee is avidly shopping at this time to achieve maximum value for the attendee's reunion dollar. The hotel package seems excellent, and will offer a choice of either the Holiday Inn or the adjacent Homewood Suites, both under Holiday Inn management, with complete reciprocity of guest privileges. The committee is also hard at work on a tiered pricing option at two other adjacent hotels. As in Seattle, where a variety of wonderful activities were enjoyed, transportation to events will be provided for all attendees.

The committee's overall goals are twofold: to provide a memorable weekend in Dayton, and to do so at a price level that will permit all who wish to attend to do so. The final cost will be somewhat dependent upon the number of attendees-- "the more the merrier," and to a large extent, "the more the reasonablier." To that end, we have included in this issue a preliminary interest survey, in hope of obtaining a "ball park" figure of how many members might attend. As usual, we will have a hospitality room open throughout the reunion as a gathering point for visiting, war story telling and the like, with military memorabilia from Boomerang Publishers expected to be on sale.

The schedule is designed to keep your evenings occupied, and to provide free time during the days for visiting, museum touring, shopping, sight seeing or pursuit of other interests.

Sights to see in Dayton include the Aviation Trail, the National Aviation

Hall of Fame, and the Wright Brothers Memorial...more in future issues. Don't forget Wright-Patt's excellent BX complex.

The only 424th Bomb Squadron patch or symbol know to us is that illustrated in the inset picture. This picture was taken




from a wooden plaque belonging to "Red" Lally, a former commander of the 424th. The 424th and ARS

MUSEUM MEMORIAL UPDATE



After a somewhat fallow period, things are starting to move ahead rapidly with the new USAF Museum Wall

Memorial. In our last report, the museum staff was still awaiting board approval of the wall memorial concept. Board approval was given this past fall and the staff immediately set to work preparing the various bid documents. Bids were accepted and I received word on December 7th that the contract had been awarded to Dodd's Monuments of Xenia, Ohio. Our notification was to see if the 307th BW was still interested in proceeding with a bench and if so, served as a notice for us to resume our planning activities.

We were told that work would begin in mid-December on the memorial base, weather permitting. Otherwise, the project would not start until May 1995. As luck would have it, Dayton set a new winter record for the latest date without any snow and, in fact, we were basking in 50 and 60 degree temperatures in late December. I knew that the memorial would be well under way before we got moving again and that the museum staff would be waiting for our input.

For reasons known only to them, the start of construction was delayed until April 1995 and they expressed gratitude to our organization for our patience during this period. So, we find ourselves right on the timeline. On January 22, 1995, Mr. Robert Bobbitt, Public Affairs Specialist, notified me that our organization paperwork was in order and they

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firmly committed one of the three bench sites at the memorial to us. This is what we had anticipated, but it is always nice to have things confirmed.

Upon receipt of this commitment, I again met with the people who will do the work on our bench. The good news here is that we will be using the same company that was awarded the Museum contract for the Memorial Wall. We are assured a quality job by a caring contractor and that our choice of materials will blend with those used in the wall itself. I am extremely satisfied with the professional knowledge they offer our organization and their keen interest in maintaining the highest standards of quality throughout the project.

One of the harder tasks associated with this memorial is deciding on what to say and what to depict on the bench. Both the museum staff and the monument company have strongly recommended that we keep things simple. I've received several comments from our members and some of them have been tentatively incorporated into our design work. Our next task is to get the "CAMERA READY ART-WORK" completed and receive approval from the monument company and the museum staff.

Based on our latest meeting with the memorial company, our original estimate of cost for this project is holding up fairly well. The company can't give us a final bench cost until we give them the 'CAMERA READY ARTWORK" for etching and engraving costs. It does seem that we can complete the bench memorial for approximately \$3500. The major unknown at this time is the actual cost to the USAF Museum Foundation for siteing and future maintenance costs. Their

estimates of cost are being skewed due to ongoing revisions in military policies con-

cerning museum support. There is a trend at the federal level toward ensuring a self sustaining ability for projects similar to this. As a result, I am forced to revise my total cost estimate upwards slightly, but believe that we will be relatively well off when all of the final numbers do come in.

The latest information from Tony Minnick shows that the memorial fund is relatively close to reaching our goal. We are still approximately \$500 short of our objective and I would like to personally thank each of you who have contributed so generously to this point. As I've said in the past, this is a memorial to ALL of

It puts you at the center of the action in a way no ordinary movie can, drawing you in with images that are so real you want to touch them, so powerful you can feel them. IMAX incorporates state-of-the-art technology, film frames three times the size of conventional 70mm frames. 

World War Two Japanese Surrender Document

INSTRUMENT OF SURRENDER

e, acting by command of and in behalf of the Emperor of Japan, the Japanese Government and the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters, hereby accept the provisions set forth in the declaration issued by the heads of the Governments of the United States, China and Great Britain on 26 July 1945, of Potsdam, and subsequently adhered to by the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, which four powers are hereafter referred to as the Allied Powers.

We hereby proclaim the unconditional surrender to the Allied Powers of the Japanese imperial General Headquarters and of all Japanese armed forces and all armed forces under Japanese control wherever situated.

We hereby command all Japanese forces wherever situated and the Japanese people to cease hostilities drithwith, to preserve and save from damage all ships, aircraft, and military and civil property and to comply with all requirements which may be imposed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or by agencies of the Japanese Government of his direction.

We hereby command the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters to issue at once orders to the Commanders of all Japanese forces and all forces under Japanese control wherever situated to surrender unconditionally themselves and all forces under their control.

We hereby command all civil, military and naval officials to obey and enforce all proclamations, orders and directives deemed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to be proper to effectuate this surrender and issued by him or under his authority and we direct all such officials to remain at their posts and to continue to perform their non-combatant duties unless specifically relieved by him or under his authority.

We hereby undertake for the Emperor, the Japanese Government and their successors to carry out the provisions of the Potsdam Declaration in good faith, and to issue whatever orders and take whatever action may be required by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or by any office designated representative of the Allied Powers for the purpose of giving effect to that Declaration.

We hereby command the Japanese Imperial Government and the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters at once to liberate all allied prisoners of war and civilian internees now under Japanese control and to provide for their protection, care, maintenance and immediate transportation to places as directed.

The authority of the Emperor and the Japanese Government to rule the state shall be subject to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers who will take such steps as he deems proper to effectuate these terms of surrenders.
