

President's Column Branson - Plan B

t seemed like a simple enough enterprise. We've established a congenial pattern for our reunions over the years and Branson, with its wide array of options, seemed to fit right into that pattern: select some popular shows and tours, set up transport, assure plenty of free time for mixing and mingling and we'd have another hit on our hands. Alas, the best laid plans of mice and men often go astray.

One part of the problem was an "embarrassment of riches": there were too many options and no clear consensus from our members on which ones would be favored. The larger issue was that AFRI, our reunion coordinator, was unable to offer packages of shows/tours and transportation at prices that we considered acceptable. The danger was that the high costs would cause people to avoid the pricey packages (threatening the minimum-attendee thresholds) or, worse yet, skip the reunion altogether. In the words of that great American humorist, Yogi Berra, "If the people don't want to come out to the ball park, ain't nobody can stop 'em."

Consequently, the Reunion Chairman and the Association leadership decided to switch to the "Let The People Decide" model. Instead of trying to guess which shows and tours would be most popular during the week and creating a rigid schedule, we unloaded the leisure calendar (except for Friday) and are

publishing options and contact information in this newsletter for you, the members, to decide **what** you want to see and **when**. What a concept!

Please read Brent Horn's article for all the detailed information you will need. For those of you comfortable with computers, you'll be able to do most of the scheduling online. If you prefer, you'll find toll-free telephone numbers included in Brent's column for you to call and schedule your entertainment to suit yourself. The most critical point is: **DO**IT NOW! The longer you delay, the greater the likelihood that the show(s) you want will be sold out. There are also important deadlines for reunion registration and hotel reservations that need to be observed.

The big question mark in our plan is transportation. We're counting on lots of people driving and being willing to carpool to various entertainment venues. We'll plan on putting sign-up sheets for carpooling in the hospitality suite. How well that works will be up to you. If everyone cooperates, we'll save a ton of money on bus rentals. Any other ideas on how to make things go more smoothly will be welcome.

Wendy and I are looking forward to seeing you at Branson in May. Travel safely and come join the fun!

Four airlines (American, Northwest, Delta, and United) service the Springfield Branson Regional Airport. Classic Shuttle Service is an independent shuttle service in Branson offering veteran discounts. Please call 417-698-0227 to make your reservations. The current fare for one way service is \$50 for one person, \$65 for 2 people, \$80 for 3 people, \$25 each for a party of 4-10 people. Happy Trails offers service to and from the airport; current fare for one way service is \$50 for one person, \$75 total for 2 people; please call for other rates. Call 417-339-3420 to make your reservations and ask to speak with Kim. Jerry's Shuttle Service's current fare from the airport to the hotel for one way service is \$70 for one person, \$90 for 2 people, \$100 for 3 people and \$35 for each additional person. To reserve space please, call 417-334-5678. Reservations need to be made twenty-four hours in advance for all shuttle services.

Car Rentals: Budget, Avis, Hertz, National and Alamo have lots close to the airport.

Entertainment Section: You have already noticed from the enclosed sheets the show selection has been drastically cut down. The thinking behind this is – cost to the members and so many different types of shows to chose from. The cost of the shows combined with the transportation cost was getting out of hand. Your association leaders and I thought we would be better off picking our own shows and carpooling. The only scheduled shows are: Luncheon cruise on the Showboat Branson Belle and Shoji Tabuchi on Friday the 16th. For other ticket prices and times you can:

- Internet: bransontourismcenter.com. Look at the show schedules and prices, then call the Tourism Center, order your tickets and pick them up on your way into town.
- 2. Over the phone: Call the Tourism Center at 1-800-785-1550 and ask them to mail you a current show schedule and price listing. After looking over the info call them back, order your tickets and pick them up on your way into town.
- When you order your tickets thru the Tourism
 Center they will give a coupon worth 20 cents off
 per gal of gas. This coupon is good at the station
 at the Center One time good deal.

Golf Section: For the golfers, I called around and found the following info:

- All courses require soft (no metal) spikes and proper golfing attire. Carts are included in the pricing and they all have club/shoe rental. Branson has a 12% sales tax rate. The costs shown below are the base costs with out tax.
- Branson Creek: 417-339-GOLF. \$90.00. 18 holes / par 71, 5032 to 7036 yds depending on the tees.
 Reservations req. 30 days in advance.
- 3. <u>Holiday Hills:</u> 417-334-4834. 0800-1200 \$55.00, 1200-1500 \$41.00, after 1500 \$29.00. 18 holes /par 68, 4414 to5771 yds depending on the tees. **Reservations req. 30 days in advance.**
- 4. Pointe Royale: 417-334-4477. \$75.50. 18 holes / par 70, 4388 to 6167 yds depending on the tees. Reservations req. 7 days in advance.
- 5. Thousand Hills: 417-336-5874. \$65.78. 18 holes / par 64, 3616 to 5111 yds depending on the tees.
 Reservations req. 60 days in advance. This seems to be one of Branson's most popular courses and is close to the hotel.

Since these courses require from 7 to 60 days advance reservations, I suggest you golfers get together and set up your tee times. From your cards and letters the following have shown an interest in playing golf: Peter & Pat McKay, Tim Timmons, Earl Johnson, Arnold Bruland and Joseph Wratten.

Vegetarian Diners: Since AFRI is limited to listing two entrees, the vegetarian meal will have to be a **"write in"**. AFRI says to use the blank line "DISABILITY/DIETARY RE-

STRICTIONS" for the entry. The cost of the meal is \$23.00, so add the appropriate amount to the total to be paid to Armed Forces Reunions, Inc.

LAFB's Gift to Lincoln - Bowling Lake Rehab

According to a recent article in the Lincoln Journal Star, the rehab of Bowling Lake should soon be complete. Constructed in 1958 at LAFB to support water skiing, under city ownership it transitioned to a fishing lake and in recent years has deteriorated, filling with silt and trash fish. As a result, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission has taken rehab steps designed to make it a "great place to fish" The lake has been desilted, and is now 20 feet deep at the deepest point with an average depth of 8 feet. Water clarity and aquatic habitat is improved and the shoreline has been improved for angler access. Stocking with largemouth bass, bluegills and channel cat is planned so in two years it will be a prime fishing spot.

The Hoisington Family

Most of us remember MGen Perry M Hoisington, who was our Division Commander until he departed for the Pentagon in the summer of 1958. But, only a few of us know that he had a younger sister of military renown. Major General Elizabeth P Hoisington led the Women's Army Corps in the 1960s and 70s during a period of dramatic change. Elizabeth, one of the first two women promoted to general rank in the US Military, passed away 21 August 2007, in Springfield, Virginia, at the age of 88, according to a Washington Post obituary, forwarded by Ivens "Buck" Buchanan. She had an illustrious career and oversaw many changes before she retired in 1971. Based on the foundation she laid down the WACs were integrated into the regular army structure in 1978. Post retirement, she served on the board of visitors for the Virginia Military Institute and was a fund raiser for the Army Women's Museum at Fort Lee. She never married, saying "The Army is my first love".

Gen Perry Hoisington took his last flight in April 2006, but Elizabeth is survived by a younger brother, Lt Col

Robert H Hoisington. Robert had been captured during WWII and became a German POW. Elizabeth personally located Robert in the prison camp following its liberation by allied forces. Perry and Elizabeth were the first brother/sister set of generals in the armed forces, and came from a military family, their grandfather being a founder of the Kansas National Guard, and their father an Army marksman and Colonel.

Jim Villa's Memories On the Flight Line

Brake and Approach Chutes

Whenever some aircrew member needed to do a takeoff or landing to fulfill his requirements, we would need to have a couple people to load another brake chute. The airplane would return and land early from a mission. We would meet the airplane and guide him into a parking place. We would connect with ground cord and headsets and then the AC would shut down engines 1, 2 and 3. The right side engines (4, 5 &6) would remain running.

The two of us maintenance guys would open the brake chute compartment and place another chute in place, lace the containing canvas and close the brake chute spring loaded doors. The AC who would not be going around again would come down out of the cockpit and would come back with us and hook the brake chute clevis in its attachment point. We would close up the brake chute compartment and get prepared to start up the shut down engines. This would be the usual sequence.

One particular day, I reported in for the day shift with "A" section and there wasn't much going on. The airplanes which were being flown that day had been launched in the wee hours of the morning. After we had a short briefing, we did the flight line FOD policing and straightening up of the flight line equipment. Our flight chief told me and one other guy to hang around the rest of the day to put another brake chute on an airplane when it came back from its mission. The airplane would be down around two in the afternoon.

Well, my partner and I then did some "coffee time" at the base ops snack bar, made early chow and were back out on the flight line at the appointed time. I always carried my tool bag whenever I was out on the flight line. This particular day, that practice would bear fruit.

The airplane was on time and when they taxied in, we guided them into a parking slot, chocked her and I plugged in the ground cord. As soon as I made contact with the AC, he shut down 1, 2 & 3 engines. My partner opened the entrance door and we proceeded aft with the packed brake chute. We opened the brake chute compartment, placed the chute into it, laced the chute in and was about to close the brake chute doors when we found the latch on the doors was broken. My first thought was that the go around couldn't be done. I went and climbed the entrance ladder to inform the pilot what had taken place. The pilot who was going to do the go around was sitting in the AC's seat and the AC he had replaced was standing in the walkway isle
